

#### Year 5 Progress

One of our vulnerable pupils has received support from Simon Barret this year. They are now on track in maths and have closed the progress gap in reading and writing. All other pupils off track has received interventions throughout the year. One children has also had some adult support in class for English and maths up to three times a week.

#### Year 4 Progress

Initial progress data shows that the majority of pupils are meeting their personal target for writing and maths. 4 of the six pupils have received Read Write Inc intervention support.

All pupils off track have received intervention support. One of these pupils has low attendance 81% due to an underlying health condition.

# **Personal Development- Wellbeing**

4 of our children are receiving Thrive support, six are receiving ELSA support. 4 pupils are being monitored to see if they need extra support. The HSLW is working with one of our pupils.
